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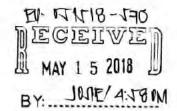

We are pleased to transmit the Annual Audit Report on the Public-Private Partnership Center of the Philippines for the Calendar Year 2017 prepared by the team headed by Ms. Melinda R. Barcial, as Audit Team Supervisor, and Ms. Elenita T. Manaois, Audit Team Leader, in compliance with Section 2, Article IX-D of the Philippine Constitution and Section 43 of the Presidential Decree No. 1445, otherwise known as the Government Auditing Code of the Philippines.

The audit was made to ascertain the propriety of financial transactions, compliance of the Agency with prescribed laws, rules and regulations and the fairness of presentation of the financial statements (FS). Furthermore, the audit was conducted in accordance with the International Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAIs). We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for rendering an unqualified opinion on the fairness of the presentation of the FS.

The audit findings include accounting errors and deficiencies which did not materially affect the fair presentation of the FS.

The attached report consists of the Executive Summary, the Independent Auditor's Report, the audited FS, the Observations and Recommendations, which were discussed with the concerned Management officials and staff, and the Status of Implementation of Prior Year's Audit Recommendations.

We request a status report on the actions taken on the audit recommendations within sixty (60) days from the date of receipt hereof, pursuant to Section 88 of the General Provisions of the General Appropriations Act of FY 2017 (Republic Act No. 10924), using the attached Agency Action Plan and Status of Implementation (AAPSI).

We express our appreciation for the valuable support and cooperation extended by the officials and staff of the Agency.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

A. Introduction

The *Build-Operate and Transfer (BOT) Center* was reorganized and renamed as the Public-Private Partnership Center of the Philippines (PPPCP) by virtue of Executive Order (EO) No. 8, series of 2010. It was transferred as an attached agency from the Department of Trade and Industry to the National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA). The PPPCP shall cover all Public-Private Partnership (PPP) programs and projects including all the variants or arrangements under Republic Act (RA) No. 7718, otherwise known as the *BOT Law*.

Under EO No. 8, the PPPCP exercises, among others, the following powers and functions:

- a. Conduct project facilitation and assistance to the national implementing agencies, including government owned and controlled corporations and Local Government Units (LGUs) in addressing impediments or bottlenecks in the implementation of PPP programs and projects;
- b. Provide advisory services, technical assistance, trainings and capacity development to agencies/LGUs in PPP project preparation and development;
- c. Recommend plans, policies and implementation guidelines related to PPP in consultation with appropriate oversight committees, implementing agencies, LGUs and the private sectors;
- d. Manage and administer a revolving fund to be known as the Project Development and Monitoring Facility (PDMF) for the preparation of business case, pre-feasibility and feasibility studies and tender documents of PPP programs and projects; and,
- e. Perform such other function, which may be critical in expediting and implementing effectively the PPP programs and projects of the government.

Project Development and Monitoring Facility

As part of its functions, the PPPCP manages and administers the PDMF, formerly known as the Project Development Facility (PDF) which was established as a revolving fund under EO No. 44, s. 2002. The funds are for the conduct of business case, prefeasibility and feasibility studies, and preparation of tender documents of PPP programs and projects in a timely manner, and ensure effective monitoring of PPP project implementation.

The PDMF Committee, composed of the representatives from the NEDA, Department

of Finance, Department of Budget and Management (DBM) and PPPCP, approves applications for availment. Subject to the approval of the PPP Governing Board, the PDMF Committee is mandated to formulate, prescribe and recommend policies, procedures and guidelines for the use of the PDMF for the development of PPP projects and recovery of costs charged to the fund. The PPPCP also serves as the Secretariat of the PDMF Committee.

The PPPCP is headed by Executive Director and has 116 plantilla positions comprised of 100 filled positions and five items under Contract of Service with a total of 105 personnel complements as of 31 December 2017, summarized as follows:

For CY 2017, the agency has a total appropriation of ₱156.311 million under RA No. 10924. The agency received total allotments of ₱179.461 million, of which total obligations incurred amounted to ₱152.586 million, thereby leaving a balance of ₱26.875 million.

The PDMF currently gets financing support through the Capacity Development Technical Assistance administered by the Asian Development Bank (ADB), under TA No. 7796: Republic of the Philippines – Strengthening Public-Private Partnership in the Philippines (TA 7796-PHI). The TA is a grant in its entirety co-financed by ADB, the Government of Australia, through the Australian Agency for International Development, and the Government of Canada, through the Canada International Development Agency.

C. Operational Highlights

The agency has satisfactorily accomplished their objectives, however, some components did not surpass the physical targets under its CY 2017 Major Final Output (MFO).

General Appropriations Act for CY 2017 (RA No. 10924) provided the agency with one MFO – PPP Project Advisory, Management and Monitoring Services with a total budget of \$\mathbb{P}76.600\$ million, of which \$\mathbb{P}56.094\$ million was utilized, leaving a balance of \$\mathbb{P}20.506\$ million. The MFO has four components with the corresponding budget allocation and utilization for the year presented in the next page:

Annex "C" presents the PPPCP CY 2017 Agency Performance Measures which showed satisfactory accomplishments with favorable variances.

D. Scope of Audit

The audit covered the financial audit of the accounts of the PPPCP for the year ended 31 December 2017. The audit was conducted to: (a) verify the level of assurance that may be placed on Management's assertions on the financial statements; (b) recommend agency's improvement opportunities; (c) determine the propriety of transactions as well as the extent of compliance with pertinent laws, rules and regulations; and (d) determine the extent of implementation of prior year's audit recommendations.

E. Independent Auditor's Report on the Financial Statements

The Auditor rendered an unqualified opinion on the fairness of presentation of the financial statements.

F. Summary of Significant Audit Observations and Recommendations

Among, the audit observations and corresponding recommendations discussed in detail in Part II of this report, the significant observations are summarized as follows:

1. The unreconciled discrepancy of ₱330,548.89 between the books of the PPPCP and the Procurement Service (PS) – DBM, due to various accounting errors, had affected the completeness and accuracy of the *Due from NGAs* account balance.

We recommended and Management agreed to require the Accountant to: (a) analyze the unaccounted and unreconciled balances in prior years so that adjustments could be made; (b) coordinate with the PS-DBM all the variances observed in the books for reconciliation by both agencies; and, (c) henceforth, monitor closely the *Due from NGAs*, particularly, that from the PS-DBM, to reflect the correct balance of the account.

2. The balances of the *Due from NGAs* and *Due from GOCCs* accounts continued to increase by ₱376.548 million and ₱126.134 million, respectively, from CYs 2015 to 2017 due to terminated projects as of 31 December 2017, and with noted discrepancies between the books of the PPPCP and the IAs.

We recommended and Management agreed to: (a) enforce the provision of the TAA on the payment to the PPPCP by the Implementing Agencies (IAs) concerned of project development costs for the terminated projects, plus the 10 per cent administrative cost; and, (b) require the Accountant to coordinate with the IAs concerned for the reconciliation of both accounts.

3. The Accounting Division did not maintain Supplies Ledger Cards (SLCs) and Property, Plant and Equipment Ledger Cards (PPELCs) for *Inventory* and *PPE* with balances of ₱1.598 million and ₱34.546 million, respectively, hence the difficulty in ascertaining the accuracy of the General Ledger (GL) balances. Moreover, the Property Division did not update the Property Cards (PCs).

We recommended and Management agreed to require: (a) the Accountant to maintain SLCs and PPELCs for all inventory and PPE items, respectively, in the prescribed format, and reconcile with the GL controlling accounts, and with the Report of Physical Count of Inventories and Report of Physical Count of Property, Plant and Equipment; and, (b) the Property Officer to: (i) update regularly the PCs and reconcile periodically the property records with the accounting records; and, (ii) attach property tag on each and every PPE items for control and easy identification.

The aforementioned observations and recommendations were discussed with concerned Management officials in an exit conference on 9 March 2018. Management's views and comments were incorporated in the report, where appropriate.

G. Status of Settlement of Audit Suspensions, Disallowances, and Charges

We recommended that Management require the Accountant to:

- a) Intensify/ensure the prompt settlement of the amount disallowed, particularly, those which were already rendered final and executory; and
- b) Locate the whereabouts of the former employees and pursue collections efforts.

H. Status of Implementation of Prior Years' Audit Recommendations

Out of seven prior years' audit recommendations, four were fully implemented and three were partially implemented. The details are discussed on Part III of this report.

We enjoin Management to ensure full implementation of all audit recommendations to improve the financial and operational efficiency of the agency.

Unqualified Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of **Public-Private Partnership Center of the Philippines**, which comprise the Statement of Financial Position as at 31 December 2017, and the Statement of Financial Performance, Statement of Changes in Net Assets/Equity, Statement of Cash flows, Statement of Comparison of Budget and Actual Amounts for the year then ended, and Notes to Financial Statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the **Public-Private Partnership Center of the Philippines** as at 31 December 2017, and its financial performance, changes in net assets/equity, cash flows, comparison of budget and actual amounts for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies in accordance with Philippine Public Sector Accounting Standards (PPSASs).

Basis for Unqualified Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAIs). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the agency in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with PPSASs, and for such internal control as Management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISSAIs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

Our audit involves performing procedures to obtain evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's professional judgment, including the assessment of the risk of material misstatement of the financial statements whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the agency's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the agency's internal control. Our audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

As of December 31, 2017

1. General Information/Agency Profile

The Public-Private Partnership Center of the Philippines (PPPCP), formerly Build-Operate and Transfer (BOT) Center, was reorganized and renamed as such by virtue of Executive Order (EO) No. 8, series of 2010. On 28 May 2013, EO No. 8 was amended by EO No. 136 clarifying certain provisions for a more efficient implementation of Public-Private Partnership (PPP) programs and projects. Its attachment from the Department of Trade and Industry was transferred to the National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA) for budgetary purposes and administrative supervision. The PPPCP reports directly and acts as Secretariat to the PPP Governing Board that was created as the over-all policy-making body for all PPP related matters, including the Project Development and Monitoring Facility (PDMF). Since PPP is one of the key strategies in economic development, the PPPCP is included as a member of the NEDA Infrastructure Committee – Technical Board and the NEDA Investment Coordination Committee – Technical Board.

The PPPCP is the main driver of the PPP Program and serves as the government's facilitator and catalyst in pursuing and delivering PPP projects. Under EO No. 8, the PPPCP shall cover all the PPP programs and projects including all the variants or arrangements under Republic Act No. 7718, otherwise known as the *BOT Law*. The PPPCP exercises the following powers and functions:

- a. Conduct project facilitation and assistance to the national implementing agencies, including government corporations, and Local Government Units (LGUs) in addressing impediments or bottlenecks in the implementation of PPP programs and projects;
- b. Provide advisory services, technical assistance, trainings and capacity development to agencies/LGUs in PPP project preparation and development;
- c. Recommend plans, policies and implementation guidelines related to PPP in consultation with appropriate oversight committees, implementing agencies, LGUs and the private sectors;
- Manage and administer a revolving fund to be known as the PDMF for the preparation of business case, pre-feasibility and feasibility studies and tender documents of PPP programs and projects;
- e. Monitor and facilitate the implementation of the priority PPP programs and projects of the agencies/LGUs which shall be formulated by respective agencies/LGUs in coordination with the NEDA Secretariat;

- f. Establish and manage a central database system of PPP programs and projects;
- g. Recommend improvements to timelines in processing PPP programs and project proposals, and monitor compliance of all agencies/LGUs;
- h. Prepare reports on the implementation of the PPP programs and projects of the government for submission to the President at the end of each year; and,
- i. Perform such other functions which may be critical in expediting and implementing effectively the PPP programs and projects of the government.

2. Statement of Compliance and Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements

The Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with and comply with the Philippine Public Sector Accounting Standards (PPSAS) issued by the Commission on Audit (COA) per COA Resolution No. 2014-003 dated 24 January 2014.

The financial statements have been prepared on the basis of historical cost. The Statement of Cash Flows is prepared using the direct method.

3. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

3.1 Basis of Accounting

The financial statements are prepared on an accrual basis in accordance with the PPSAS.

3.2 Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and cash in bank, deposits on call and highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less, which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value. For the purpose of the consolidated statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and short-term deposits as defined above, net of outstanding bank overdrafts.

3.3 Inventories

The PPPCP measures inventory at cost upon initial recognition. To the extent that inventory was received through non-exchange transactions, the cost of the inventory is its fair value at the end of acquisition.

The cost of inventories comprises all costs of purchase, cost of conversion, and other costs incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition.

Inventories are recognized as an expense when deployed for utilization or consumption or the related service is rendered in the ordinary course of operations of the PPPCP.

3.4 Property, Plant and Equipment

At recognition, the PPPCP measures Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE) at its cost. An item of PPE is recognized as an asset when it is tangible; held for use in the production or supply of goods or services, for rental to others, or for administrative purposes; and are expected to be used during more than one reporting period.

A PPE acquired through non-exchange transaction is measured at its fair value as at the date of acquisition.

After recognition, all PPE are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

When significant parts of PPE are required to be replaced at intervals, the PPPCP recognizes such parts as individual assets with specific useful lives and depreciates them accordingly. Likewise, when a major repair/replacement is done, its cost is recognized in the carrying amount of the plant and equipment as a replacement if the recognition criteria are satisfied.

All other repair and maintenance costs are recognized as expense in surplus or deficit as incurred.

The PPPCP begins to depreciate its asset when it is available for use such as when it is in the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by Management. The agency adopts the straight line method of depreciation using the Schedule on the Estimated Useful Life of PPE by classification prepared by COA and a residual value of five per cent of the cost.

The PPPCP derecognizes items of PPE and/or any significant part of an asset upon disposal or when no future economic benefits or service potential is expected from its continuing use. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in the surplus or deficit when the asset is derecognized.

3.5 Intangible Assets

Intangible assets are recognized when the items are identifiable non-monetary assets without physical substance; it is probable that the expected future economic benefits or service potential that are attributable to the assets will flow to the entity; and the cost or fair value of the assets can be measured reliably.

The PPPCP recognizes intangible assets at cost and begins to amortize when the items are already available for use. The straight line method is adopted in the amortization based on the useful life or over the period of expected future benefit of the assets.

3.6 Contingent Liabilities

The PPPCP does not recognize a contingent liability, but discloses details of any contingencies in the notes to the financial statements, unless the possibility of an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits or service potential is remote.

3.7 Budget Information

The annual budget is prepared on a cash basis and is published in the government website. The PPPCP adopts the cash basis for budgeting purposes and presents a separate Statement of Comparison of Budget and Actual Amounts showing the basis, timing or entity differences. Explanatory comments are provided in the notes to the annual financial statements.

3.8 Changes in Accounting Policies and Estimates

The PPPCP recognizes the effects of changes in accounting policy retrospectively and applies them prospectively.

The PPPCP corrects material prior period errors retrospectively in the first set of financial statements authorized for issue after their discovery by:

- Restating the comparative amounts for prior period(s) presented in which the error occurred; or
- If the error occurred before the earliest prior period presented, restating the opening balances of assets, liabilities and net assets/equity for the earliest prior period presented.

3.9 Employees Benefits

The employees of the PPPCP are members of the Government Service Insurance System (GSIS) which provides life and retirement insurance coverage.

The PPPCP recognizes the undiscounted amount of short term employee benefits, like salaries, wages, bonuses, allowance, etc., as expense unless capitalized, and as liability after deducting the amount paid.

OBSERVATIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Financial Audit

Accounting Errors

1. The unreconciled discrepancy of ₽330,548.89 between the books of the PPPCP and the PS-DBM, due to various accounting errors, had affected the completeness and accuracy of the *Due from NGAs* account balance.

Chapter 3, Volume III, Government Accounting Manual (GAM), prescribes the *Due from NGAs* account to record advances for purchase of goods/services as authorized by law, fund transfers to the National Government Agencies (NGAs) for implementation of projects, and other receivables from NGAs.

The balance of the account shall, at all times, be reconciled periodically with the related accounts maintained in other government agency/ies to facilitate prompt adjustment/correction of any discrepancies.

In Calendar Year (CY) 2017, the *Receivables* totalling ₱1.393 billion includes ₱3.173 million pertaining to advances to the Procurement Service – Department of Budget and Management (PS-DBM) under the *Due from NGAs* account. Confirmation with the PS-DBM showed a discrepancy of ₱330,548.89, summarized as follows:

Management commented that all discrepancies will be discussed in a meeting set on 26 April 2018 between the PPPCP and the PS-DBM to address these reconciling issues, specifically those requiring adjustments from the PS-DBM end.

We recommended and Management agreed to require the Accountant to: (a) analyze the unaccounted and unreconciled balances in prior years so that adjustments could be made; (b) coordinate with the PS-DBM all the variances observed in the books for reconciliation by both agencies; and, (c) henceforth, monitor closely the *Due from NGAs*, particularly, that from the PS-DBM, to reflect the correct balance of the account.

Accounting Deficiencies

2. The balances of the *Due from NGAs* and *Due from GOCCs* accounts continued to increase by ₱376.548 million and ₱126.134 million, respectively, from CYs 2015 to 2017 due to terminated projects as of 31 December 2017, and with noted discrepancies between the books of the PPPCP and the IAs.

Among the powers and functions of the PPPCP is to manage and administer the Project Development and Monitoring Facility (PDMF), formerly known as the Project Development Facility (PDF) established as a revolving fund under Executive Order (EO) No. 44, s. 2002.

The PDMF currently gets financing support through the Capacity Development Technical Assistance (CDTA) administered by the Asian Development Bank (ADB), Technical Assistance (TA) No. 7796: Republic of the Philippines – Strengthening Public-Private Partnership in the Philippines (TA 7796-PHI). The TA is a grant in its entirety, co-financed by the ADB, the Government of Australia,

through the Australian Agency for International Development, and the Government of Canada, through the Canada International Development Agency.

The PDMF Guidelines approved by the PDMF Board (now PDMF Committee), provide, among others, the following:

- (a) On successful completion of the bidding process, the project development cost (PDC) will be recovered by the PPPCP from the successful bidder, plus an administrative fee of 10 per cent.
- (b) The reimbursement of the PDC will be a condition precedent for contract award to the private sector proponent or concessionaire.
- (c) The Implementing Agency/Local Government Unit (IA/LGU) will repay the project development cost in full, plus the administrative fee, when due to reasons within the IA/LGU's responsibility, it fails to:
 - ➤ Bid out the project;
 - Conclude the bidding process and/or;
 - > Sign the contract with the winning bidder
- (d) When the failure is due to reason beyond IA/LGU's responsibility or control, it will repay PPPCP the 50 per cent of the PDC, plus the administrative fee.
- (e) The cost of concluding such pre-feasibility or feasibility study will be reimbursed by the IA to the PDMF, thru the budgetary process, when:
 - ➤ The pre-feasibility or feasibility study of a Project approved for PDMF funding demonstrates that the project will not be feasible; or
 - ➤ The project fails to obtain the Investment Coordination Committee (ICC) or National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA) Board approval and will no longer be pursued.
- (f) These repayment procedures are stipulated in the Technical Assistance Agreement (TAA) that will be executed between the PPPCP and the IA/LGU prior to initiation of consultant selection.

Prior to 17 March 2014, the cost sharing ratio of the Government of the Philippines (GOP) and the grantor is 44 per cent and 56 per cent, respectively. Effective 17 March 2014, the new cost sharing arrangement is 80 per cent for the GOP and 20 per cent for the grants. This cost sharing will apply to each invoice from the consultants on a gross basis.

Table 3 shows the composition of the agency's Receivable accounts under the PDMF fund totaling ± 1.385 billion as of 31 December 2017.

Termination of the projects is made by the IAs by sending letters of termination to the PPPCP, stating the status and the reasons for the cancellation/termination of the projects. In view of this, as per PDMF Guidelines, the concerned IAs has the responsibility to reimburse 100 per cent of the project development cost incurred by the PPPCP, plus 10 per cent administrative cost. However, the IAs had not reimbursed the PPPCP despite their notification to the latter of the project termination. The reasons of termination, among others, are as follows:

- No contract variation or amendment was executed to extend the term of contract;
- Fund shifting from PPP to Official Development Assistance (ODA);
- The Project, as structured/packaged, cannot be implemented through PPP;
- NEDA ICC decided to defer the project;
- Possible security issues raised by Department of National Defense Philippine Air Force;
- Protracted preparation and development of the project;
- Per amended TA agreement dated 6 November 2012, PDMF funds advanced

- to pay the TA's fee will be fully reimbursed by the Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) once the TA's final deliverables is paid;
- No re-confirmation and endorsement was made by the DPWH to the NEDA-ICC for the 2nd pass approval; and,
- Vaccine Self Sufficiency Project, Phase 2 was not pursued through PPP in view of Department of Health's (DOH) decision to use its own budget under the Health Facilities Enhancement Program following the procurement procedures under the Republic Act (RA) No. 9184.

Moreover, according to the PPPCP website, another reason for project termination was the policy directions set by the new administration, changing of funding scheme from PPP to ODA. In CY 2017, the ICC NEDA has endorsed the change in financing mode from PPP to ODA, for such projects as the New Centennial Water Source of the DPWH and North-South Railway Project of Department of Transportation (DOTr).

We recognized the effort of the agency in pursuing the collection of its receivables from IAs thru continuous sending of collection/demand letters, together with supporting documents, follow-up, and even going to the offices' location of IAs, but still a very low or non-collection of the long outstanding receivables was noted. For CY 2017, the agency has collected only \$\frac{1}{2}\$23.197 million (US\$458,702.20) from the DOTr for the PDC incurred for the Motor Vehicle Inspection System project, while no collection was received from other IAs.

Moreover, results of confirmation of the account balances from CYs 2016 to 2017 showed discrepancies between the PPPCP books and the concerned IAs/agencies, as follows:

Table 6 showed that the DPWH and the DOH both confirmed that as per their records, they have no outstanding payables to the PPPCP, because no obligations were made by their Finance Divisions to record the said payable accounts. This is an indication that the IA's Finance Divisions were not informed of

their obligations to the PPPCP despite the presence of signed TAAs with these agencies.

Due to the various terminated contracts as of 31 December 2017, the *Due from NGAs* and *Due from GOCCs* accounts had significantly increased from CYs 2015 to 2017 by \$\mathbb{P}\$376.548 million and \$\mathbb{P}\$126.134 million, respectively, or a total of \$\mathbb{P}\$502.682 million. This, despite the provision in the PDMF Guidelines that the PPPCP shall be reimbursed by the IA, thru the budgetary process, in case of termination of contracts beyond the control of the IA. Moreover, due to the unreconciled balance of subject inter-agency accounts between the PPPCP and the IAs concerned, the accuracy of the balances of the *Due from NGAs* and *Due from GOCCs* cannot be fully established.

We recommended and Management agreed to: (a) enforce the provision of the TAA on the payment to the PPPCP by the IAs concerned of PDC for the terminated projects, plus the 10 per cent administrative cost; and, (b) require the Accountant to coordinate with the IAs concerned for the reconciliation of both accounts.

3. The Accounting Division did not maintain SLCs and PPELCs for *Inventory* and *PPE* with balances of \$\mathbb{P}\$1.598 million and \$\mathbb{P}\$34.546 million, respectively, hence the difficulty in ascertaining the accuracy of the GL balances. Moreover, the Property Division did not update the PCs.

The Agency's *Inventories* and *PPE* have balances of $\clubsuit 1.598$ million and $\clubsuit 34.546$ million, respectively, as of 31 December 2017.

Section 17, Chapter 8, Volume I, GAM prescribed the use of Supplies Ledger Card (SLC) to record materials received, issued, and the balances, both in quantity and amount, at any time, which shall be maintained by the Accounting Division/Unit for each kind of supplies and materials. Appendix 57, Volume III of the GAM, also prescribed the instructions in the preparation and maintenance of the SLC, to wit:

- a. The SLC is a form used in the Accounting Division/Unit for each type of supplies to record all receipts and issues made. It shall be maintained by fund cluster.
- b. Transactions shall be posted promptly from source documents.
- c. The agency shall conduct physical count of inventories every semester. The semestral physical inventory of supplies shall be reconciled with the SLCs and controlling accounts and Supply and/or Property records. Any discrepancies shall be immediately verified and adjusted.

Section 42, Chapter 10, Volume I, GAM further requires the Chief Accountant to maintain Property, Plant and Equipment Ledger Card (PPELC) for each category of PPE, which shall be used to record promptly the acquisition, description, custody, estimated useful life, depreciation, impairment loss, disposal, and other information about the asset. On the other hand, the Property and Supply Office/Unit shall maintain Property Cards (PCs) for PPE in their custody to account for the receipt and disposition of the same.

In the process of our verification on the accuracy of the General Ledger (GL) balances and comparison of the Inventories and PPE items in the Report of Physical Count of Inventories (RPCI) and Report of Physical Count of PPE (RPCPPE), respectively, with the accounting records, we noted that the Accounting Division did not maintain SLCs and PPELCs to support the GL balances of the *Inventories* and *PPE* accounts.

Likewise, we observed during our test count of PPE that not all PCs were updated by the Property Officer and almost all PPE items have no property tags for proper identification, which resulted in difficulty locating various PPE items.

We recommended and Management agreed to require: (a) the Accountant to maintain SLCs and PPELCs for all inventory and PPE items, respectively, in the prescribed format, and reconcile with the GL controlling accounts, and with the RPCI and RPCPPE; and, (b) the Property Officer to: (i) update regularly the PCs and reconcile periodically the property records with the accounting records; and, (ii) attach property tag on each and every PPE items for control and easy identification.

Compliance Issues

Gender and Development (GAD)

4. The agency spent ₱1.462 million, or only 35 per cent of the allocated funds of ₱4.234 million for GAD, which contributed to the non-accomplishment of four out of 11 planned GAD activities. Moreover, the GPB was not endorsed by the PCW.

Section 30 of RA No. 10924 or the General Appropriations Act (GAA) of 2017, requires, among others, the concerned agencies to formulate a GAD Plan designed to address gender issues within their concerned sectors or mandate, which shall be endorsed by the Philippine Commission on Women (PCW), pursuant to PCW-NEDA-DBM Joint Circular No. 2012-01.

For CY 2017, the agency allocated budget of \$\mathbb{P}4.234\$ million for its GAD activities. Of this amount, only \$\mathbb{P}1.462\$ million or 35 per cent was actually spent for the implementation of these activities.

In addition, the Audit Team noted that the GAD Plan and Budget (GPB) of the agency was not endorsed by the PCW due to some revisions made on the GPB until the last quarter of 2017. Based on their online conversation with the PCW System Administrator dated 10 January 2018, the PPPCP has requested extension to revise their GPB for CY 2017 where they intend to include PDMF GAD-related activities. However, the PCW Monitoring and Evaluation Division informed the PPPCP that they could no longer grant an extension because the review and endorsement process for the said GBP had already lapsed.

Despite the non-endorsement by the PCW, the validated PPPCP Accomplishment Report (AR) showed that seven out of 11 GAD activities were accomplished. These, together with the four activities which were not accomplished, with the budget and amount spent, are shown in the *Table 7*.

We recommended and Management agreed to: (a) coordinate closely with the PCW and effect required corrections on the GPB for its timely endorsement; and, (b) consider the problems encountered in the formulation of subsequent year's GPB to improve the accomplishment rate on the planned GAD activities.

Compliance with Other Mandatory Accounts/Areas

Senior Citizens and Persons with Disability (PWD)

5. The PPPCP has implemented programs and activities intended to address the concerns and needs of Senior Citizens and PWD in compliance with Section 31 of the General Provisions of the GAA for FY 2017.

Section 31 of RA No. 10924, requires, among others, that all agencies of the government formulate plans, programs, and projects intended to address the concerns of senior citizens and PWD insofar as it relates to their mandated functions, and integrate the same in their regular activities.

For CY 2017, the PPPCP allocated \$\mathbb{P}\$19,900.70 for activities conducted to address the concerns of senior citizens and PWD, as summarized below.

The agency has crafted and institutionalized the PPPCP Program for Senior Citizens and PWD through Office Circular No. 06-2015 dated 1 December 2015, which aims to, among others, recognize their privileges for self and social enhancement services as stipulated in Section 5(d) of RA No. 9994, the "Expanded Senior Citizens Act of 2010".

We recommended that Management sustain the implementation of programs, projects, and activities that promote the welfare of senior citizens and PWD.

6. Tax Laws and Regulations, GSIS Premiums and other loan amortizations, and PhilHealth and Pag-IBIG Contributions

The PPPCP complied with the withholding and remittances of mandatory deductions pursuant to the regulations issued by the Bureau of Internal Revenue (BIR), Government Service Insurance System (GSIS), PhilHealth and Pag-IBIG, as shown below:

8. Supreme Court's Decisions on PDAF and DAP

The PPPCP has not received any Priority Development Assistance Fund (PDAF) and Disbursement Acceleration Fund (DAP) funds from the DBM or from other agency as of 31 December 2017.

9. Hiring of Casual, Job Orders, Contractual and Consultant

For CY 2017, PPPCP hired 72 contractual employees representing additional workforce to provide technical assistance and such other related functions as may be assigned. However, as of 31 December 2017, only five remained in the agency. The PPPCP paid the total amount of ₱1.217 million for the services rendered by these contractual employees charged against Maintenance and Other Operating Expenses of the agency.

10. Status of Settlement of Audit Suspensions, Disallowances and Charges

For CY 2017, no Notices of Suspension (NS), Disallowance (ND), and Charge (NC) were issued.

On the other hand, the status of settlement of disallowances with beginning balance of P8.937 million is presented in the *Table 11*.

As of reporting date, COA has issued seven Notices of Finality of Decision (NFDs) and seven COA Orders of Execution (COEs).

Included in the balance are the unauthorized payment of CEMA for CYs 2011 and 2012 with remaining unsettled balance of ₱2.726 million which are covered by NFD and COE. Of this amount, ₱2.363 million pertains to CEMA 2011 which is subject of a Motion for Reconsideration received by the Commission Proper on 5 October 2017, while the balance of P0.363 million is being settled thru salary deductions authorized under the 1st Endorsement dated January 5, 2018 from the Prosecution and Litigation Office, Legal Services Sector, COA, pursuant to COA Resolution 2017-021 dated November 3, 2017.

The remaining \$\mathbb{P}\$5.466 million of the unsettled disallowance as of year-end pertains to former BOT employees who are no longer connected with the agency. The Accountant has been sending demand letters to the concerned persons liable, but there were no responses to date.

We recommended that Management require the Accountant to:

- a) Intensify/ensure the prompt settlement of the amount disallowed, particularly, those which were already rendered final and executory; and
- b) Locate the whereabouts of the former employees and pursue collections efforts.
